extradite	<i>v.</i>	chupau (<i>a.</i>); extradition <i>n.</i> achupau
extraordinary	<i>adj.</i>	tunjanja (<i>s.</i>)
extraversion	<i>n.</i>	ijuchi (<i>n.</i>)
extravert	<i>adj.</i>	1) juchi (<i>s.</i>) characterized by extraversion; 2) ujuchi (<i>n.</i>) extravert person
extraterrestrial	<i>n.</i>	1) utilan (<i>n.</i>) alien, being from outer space; 2) na tilan (<i>a.</i>) coming from outer space, not from earth: acho na tilan – an extraterrestrial signal
extreme	<i>adj.</i>	vilu (<i>s.</i>) also: extremely, radical(<i>ly</i>)
extremism	<i>n.</i>	vilupuno (<i>n.</i>) radicalism
extremist	<i>n.</i>	uvilupuno (<i>n.</i>)
eye	<i>n.</i>	ayun (<i>n.</i>); eyeball <i>n.</i> yunsu (<i>n.</i>); eyebrow <i>n.</i> zino (<i>n.</i>); eyebrows <i>n.</i> zinonyo (<i>n.</i>); eyelash <i>n.</i> yunzi (<i>n.</i>); eyelashes <i>n.</i> yunzizi (<i>n.</i>); eyelid <i>n.</i> yunchi (<i>n.</i>); eyelids <i>n.</i> yunchinyo (<i>n.</i>); eyes <i>n.</i> ayunyo (<i>n.</i>) pair of eyes; eye socket <i>n.</i> yuncha (<i>n.</i>)
e-zine	<i>n.</i>	kwetako (<i>n.</i>)
